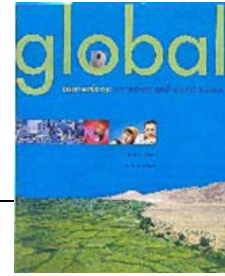


People Moving (Part 1)

- 3) What are the “3D jobs” and why do some immigrants take them so readily?
- 4) “The most significant consequences of immigration is the alteration of the cultural, ethnic, racial, and political make-up of the receiving country.” Discuss, using specific examples to support or refute this statement.
- 5) Do you think it is feasible for either Germany or the United States to allow the levels of immigration shown below? Explain.

- 6) Create two maps to show the sending and receiving countries of refugees, using the data attached. Use a gradient colour scheme (the darker the colour, the higher number of refugees), grouping the numbers into five equally spaced categories.
 - a) Analyze and comment upon any patterns that emerge on the maps.
 - b) What factors determine the number of refugees from a particular country? Could there be refugees from Canada? Why or why not?
 - c) Is a government’s policy on immigration and refugee status a critical factor in determining the numbers of refugees it accepts?
 - d) Why do some Canadians feel that their country accepts too many refugees? Is this a valid judgement? Why or why not?
 - e) Which countries accept the most refugees? Why is this not a surprise? Are these countries likely to be able to deal effectively with the refugees who arrive? Why or why not?
